They were already familiar with the Wind Point area as they had previously lived just a few minutes away on Stonebridge Drive in Caledonia.



Outside of work, Jason and Jessica make the most of their free time. Jason loves anything outdoors—whether





2025 WIND POINT GOLF PUTTING CHAMPIONSHIP

The 12th annual Wind Point Golf Putting Championship at Shoop Park Golf Course took place on September 27, 2025.

This event, the annual Wind Point Golf Putting Championship, is one of the most cherished contemporary traditions here in Wind Point where chivalry, friendships, and gallantry are encompassed by skills, sportsmanship, and cheering. Some of these games have been driven by dominant performances, and others have been decided by the slightest of margins with unprecedented drama.

There is no financial investment to play in the annual tournament and so it is all about the love of the game with annual bragging rights on the line. Now, each annual champion indeed receives a beautiful Wind Point Golf Putting Championship plaque to place as a centerpiece on the mantle, and there are various gifts for the top three finishers.

During this majestic autumn Saturday morning, the golfers come prepared, the playing area is set on the green, and the scoreboard is ready to

display the results of another champion. Once again, the gentle sound of the theme music to The Masters Tournament fills the background air as participants prepare for battle.

This year brings a total of ten participants to Shoop Park on this Saturday morning. Some are participating in their first tournament, while others have been here for several years. This talented list includes the 2024 defending champion, Chuck Christiano (AKA Captain Clutch). He is accompanied by returning putting tournament veterans "Magic" Mary Ann Konsin, Mark Levine, Townend Hunt, and Tom Savas. This year also brings a record of four new competitors. This includes newcomers Cathy Gaspero, Marty Barker, Carmen Gaspero, and Tiffnee Monroe.

Long time village resident John Murphy also participates again with the special pregame ceremonies. John performs an original song on his ukulele for all to enjoy titled "The Wind Point Putt-Club Stroll." (Thank you, John, for your creativity of commencing the



ceremonies and making this such a festive gathering every year!)

Our celebrity score keeper once again is Cindy Johnson. Cindy will keep track of the official leaderboard throughout the tournament.

As each participant is introduced, each golfer explains how long he / she has lived in the community, and shares a fun fact with the group. Then, each one then picks a random number from a deck of cards so we can determine the official putting order.

The rules of engagement for the Wind Point Putting Contest have been very standard over the years. All contestants are provided three putt shots from six different stations set on the putting green which wraps around the middle hole located on the green. All golfers begin at the first station, which is set closest to the hole and then they proceed to each successive station where the distances become farther and more difficult. Each successful putt from stations 1-5 is allotted one point, and each successful putt from station 6 is allotted two points. If a golfer successfully converts the last shot from the sixth

station, the golfer is then provided another two point bonus shot attempt.

The first station is set up six feet from the hole. Now, the average success rate to connect on a standard six-foot putt is about 61%, however, the slope of the putting green on this particular day at Shoop due to the location of the putting hole would make this and all the attempts much more difficult.

The anticipation is intense and contagious. There is a tremendous amount of proud history tied to the annual Wind Point Golf Putting Championship. Here is a little history: In 2015, John Brashaw pulls out a tenacious win in overtime. In 2016, Jim Baldwin connects with two six round putts to seal the deal. In 2017, Chuck Christiano begins his local legacy by hitting his last ball of the six round, and then connects on his bonus shot for a comeback win. In 2018, *Captain Clutch* is the only one to score in the 6th round to capture his second straight title. In 2019, Chuck once again is the only golfer to connect in the 6th round for a two point victory. The 2020 contest represents one of the most historic pair of shots known as the

"Miracle on Putting Green" as Magic Mary Ann Konsin connects on two consecutive 20 foot shots for one of the most dramatic comeback performances in sports history. The 2022 contest goes to overtime as Captain Clutch holds off then new-comer Kerry Brown to earn his fourth championship.

Yes, this putting green represents history, opportunity, and hope. We have seen it transpire year after year. What will 2025 bring?

No two contests are ever alike as hole placements on the putting green consistently change from week to week at Shoop. As a result, sometimes a farther shot is actually easier to sink than a closer shot due to the conditions of the green in terms of angles and breaks. The wind could also become a factor as well.

As fate would have it similar to 2024. Chuck Christiano is the first one to putt from the first station in the 2025 championship. There is a slight disadvantage of going first as the other participants have the opportunity to see how the green is playing the ball in terms of angles.

The angle and slope of the putting green on this day make this shot historically difficult. As a result, only five of the ten contestants get on the scoreboard, and only one, Mary Ann, makes two putts.

All the golfers understand that it is very important to have a strong start as each station afterward becomes tougher and tougher to earn points due to the increased distances from the cup.

The second-round station is located nine feet from the hole, and first-time competitor, Marty Barker, lights up the scoreboard with a perfect three-forthree performance! Townsend Hunt connects with a pair of putts himself. At the end of the round, there is now a three-way tie for first place between Mary Ann, Townsend, and Marty.

During the third round (12 feet), Marty and Townsend both convert a shot to now make it a two-way tie. Also, Chuck Christiano connects on a shot. Every single point is absolutely precious on this challenging course.

The fourth-round shot has a very difficult angle and the scoring is minimal. However, Captain Clutch is CONTINUED ▶

successful on two of his putts to make it a one-point contest. Also, "Magic MaryAnn" places one of her own to return to a three-way tie for first place at four points. This is now anyone's game as we head into the final two rounds!

The fifth round only has one participant score. Mark Levine's great putt now places him in a two-way tie for second place with Chuck. There is still a log jam at the top with three golfers tied for first.

Now, we move into the magical sixth round which represents a 21foot putt with double value. If golfers should knock in their third and final shot (also known as the Atomic *Ball*), they also earn a fourth bonus shot worth a potential two more points. Statistically speaking, the odds of a good golfer connecting on this distance is roughly 6%. With that fact stated, it is still anyone's contest as a potential eight points are possible in the frame. History has demonstrated that many of these tournaments are won and lost right here.

At this very moment, five of the competitors are within one successful putt from taking the lead. Will we see drama along the lakefront for another fantastic finish!?!

Between the uphill angle and slope of the ground, this final station creates a very difficult scenario for all participants. As each ball is hit, breaths are being held as the balls smoothly roll across the green.

It will take only one successful shot from any five of the top participants on the leaderboard to potentially win the 2025 championship.

As fate would have it on this particular Saturday, no one connects on this difficult shot for a decisive victory.

As result, we now finish regulation with a three-way tie for first place between Marty, Townsend, and Mary Ann. We now go to overtime for a historic finish!

The three remaining participants now go back to the first station for three shots each. In the first round of OT, both Marty and Townsend tie each other again for the lead to force a double overtime.

This double overtime session now represents a historic conclusion to this annual contest. Marty and Townsend go headto-head, and it is Townsend who seals the deal in historic fashion.

Yes, Townsend Hunt is your 2025 Wind Point Golf Putting Champion! Townsend, who was competing for his second time in this annual contest, is very gracious. He states, "This is such a fun event, and I always enjoy meeting new people."

Marty Barker, who was playing in his first tournament with the support of his wife, Robin, at his side throughout the session, earns second place.





A Candlelight Concert

The Choral Arts Society and Music & More historic collaborative musical production will take place on December 6, 2025 (7:00 pm) at First Presbyterian Church.

The Choral Arts Society of Southeastern Wisconsin (CAS) and the First Presbyterian Church's popular *Music & More* series will present a collaborative program for the first time in their collective histories. "We have been guests of this well-known program," states CAS Artistic Director James Schatzman, "but this is the first time we have sat down and planned an entire program where the CAS is a central part of the presentation."

Georgia Hall, Music & More Chair, adds, "I am excited for this first-time collaboration between Music & More and the Choral Arts Society! Both organizations have brought the highest quality music to our community for more than three decades, and the historic First

Presbyterian Church sanctuary is the perfect setting for this candlelight event. The performers, music, and readings have been carefully chosen to create a peaceful, meditative, and memorable experience for the audience."

A Candlelight Concert collaboration will take place on Saturday, December 6, at 7:00 PM at First Presbyterian Church, 716 College Avenue in downtown Racine. Built by noted architect Lucas Bradley in 1852 and added to the National Register Places in 1973, the church is a special place. CAS Associate Conductor Pat Badger notes, "While the Greek Revival building holds a sanctuary that is one of the best acoustic venues in the area, it also embraces abolitionist history. In the mid-1800s,

while hymns were sung, beneath the floorboards hid courageous and bold African Americans, seeking freedom. Amongst the candlelight of the present, what an opportunity to quietly affirm how we might carry forward their example of hope for the future."

Into this intimate and meditative setting, singer songwriter Mark Paffrath will weave the words of poet Wendell Berry and lyrics of John Jacob Niles. Darlene Rivest, Ryan Andersen, Pat Badger, and Randy Fischer will share the reflective sounds of Mannheim Steamroller's Chip Davis. Poems of American icons Mary Oliver, Susan Cooper, and Rosemary Wahtola Trommer, read by Victoria Vollman, will surround the Choral Arts Society's singing of works by Gustav Holst, Casting Crowns, and Morten Lauridsen.

And adding to the visual wonder of this event will be the dancers of The Studio of Classical Dance Arts, directed by Linda Bennett and Marc Darling, in their imagining of the Snow Scene from Tchaikovsky's iconic *Nutcracker Ballet*. Mark and Linda note, "The Studio is always thrilled to be a part of

the fabulous tapestry of music, dance and holiday spirit that *Music and More* and CAS create! The First Presbyterian Church is beautifully decorated during the Christmas season. It promises to be a magical evening."

The Choral Arts Society was established in 1987 by founder and Artistic Director, James Schatzman. Weeks after its founding, the ensemble sang the Wisconsin premiere of Vaughan Williams' *Hodie* with the Racine Symphony Orchestra. Since its beginning, the CAS has partnered with the likes of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, UW-Parkside, The Studio of Classical Dance Arts, The Prairie School, and contemporary composers, including Adrian Snell, Carol Barnett, Margaret Burk, and Glenn Burleigh. "Collaboration is in our DNA." said Schatzman.

The Choral Arts Society now makes its home at First Presbyterian Church. This fall, the CAS began its 39th season under maestro Schatzman, continuing to commission new works, perform premieres, outreach to young artists, and seek to be innovative while honoring classic masterworks.

Music & More was founded in 1994 by First Presbyterian Church's former Pastor Randy Bush. Each Thursday during the summer, the series welcomes local and regional performers. The aims were—and continue to be—building community, celebrating artists, and providing a way to give back to local non-profit service organizations through a free will offering. Over the years, Music & More also embraced performances by young artists and now awards three youth scholarships each season. A staple of the Racine arts community, Music & More has grown into one of First Presbyterian Church's significant outreach programs and now includes a summer series, Fall and Spring samplers, and a candlelight concert.

The beauty of song, danced round with word, amongst candlelit history promises to be a feast for the senses. A unique event. More than music. A celebration of being in community with one another in the darkest season of the year.



The book highlights some of our wonderful adventures, but also the quiet special moments with her by my side and snuggling in bed.







As of December 31, 2025, we regret to share that we will no longer be partnering with hoopla to offer e-books, audiobooks and other media to library users. Instead, we will be prioritizing Libby and Comics Plus as our primary tools for digital content.

Through Libby, borrow e-books, audiobooks and magazines from wherever you are. It's a free service that comes with your Racine Public Library card. Items are returned automatically when your borrowing time is over, so you never have to worry about returning your titles. The Libby app is available on iOS and Android devices.

With Comics Plus, check out e-books from our ever-growing collection of comics, graphic novels and manga. All titles are always available to all library users, meaning you can check out anything you want with no hold lists needed. Items are automatically returned after a week, but you can continue to check them out as many times as you want until you're done reading.





PROPOSED 2026 VILLAGE BUDGET AND PUBLIC HEARING

The 2026 Village Budget will be considered for adoption at the Village Board meeting and public hearing on Thursday, November 13, at

5:00 pm. The budget is the result of a four-month-long process that involved several public meetings with the Village Board and finance committee.

The resulting budget reflects the Village's ongoing mission to provide high-quality municipal service cost-effectively and efficiently. Compared to 2025, the 2026 budget has an overall revenue and expenditure decrease of 12.0%. This is primarily due to fewer capital projects in 2026 being funded through the general fund.

The following are the highlights from the proposed 2026 budget:

Budget Highlights - General Fund

- \$4,422 decrease (7.2%) to General Transportation Aids from the State Department of Transportation. The amount is based on a rolling six-year average of local funds expended for road projects and transportation-related items by the Village.
- \$19,500 additional funds for the Police
 Department's grant from the State for the Click
 It or Ticket seat belt enforcement program.
- \$12,500 (22.7%) decrease in fines/forfeitures due to the decline in citations being issued.
- \$3,000 decrease (21.4%) in Lighthouse Revenues.
- \$4,900 decrease (9.2%) in miscellaneous revenue as the Village's investment returns are still less than before the start of the COVID pandemic.
- \$103,000 increase (13.3%) in outside services as the Village will explore a referendum planning consultant.
- \$46,00 decrease to assessor services.
- \$14,500 increase for Outside IT service.
- 6.2% for DPW snow wages regular hours as the team will be adding anti-icing to the process of snow wages.
- \$640 decrease (5.3%) to Worker's Compensation Insurance.
- 3% increase to base wages for Village employees.
- \$4,790 (11.8%) increase in the Village's contribution to the Wisconsin Retirement System.

Budget Highlights - Proposed Capital Improvement Plan (General Fund)

- \$4.2 Million in General Government Facilities for a new municipal building.
- \$21,200 for equipment replacement. \$5,000 for a new trailer and \$10,000 for a surveyor's transit for a total of 15,000 for new DPW equipment and \$6,200 for a new copier.
- \$1.3 Million for the reconstruction of 4 Mile Road. \$2.6 Million for watermain replacement on 4-Mile Road and \$534.000 for stormwater work.

PLEASE DO NOT FEED THE DEER

Feeding deer and other wildlife may seem like a kind gesture, but it can have serious negative consequences for both the animals and the ecosystem. Human food can disrupt their natural foraging



behaviors, leading to dependency on artificial sources of food. This can also result in overpopulation in certain areas, increased disease transmission, and conflicts with humans as animals become more accustomed to urban environments.

Moreover, supplemental feeding can alter natural food webs, affecting other species and the overall health of the habitat. To protect wildlife and maintain ecological balance, it's essential to admire these creatures from a distance and refrain from feeding them.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY REMINDERS

With the shorter days this time of year, it is especially important to wear reflective gear or carry a flashlight when you go out for a walk or bicycle ride. As a matter of safety, pedestrians need to be visible to vehicles and to other pedestrians. A variety of clothing items are available with





lights or reflective fabric, such as jackets, vests, wristbands, dog collars, shoes, and belts. Many stores also carry reflective tape - and pick something up for your dog while you are at it!

If no sidewalks exist on the road, it is recommended to walk facing oncoming traffic on the same side of the road as the oncoming traffic. Also, you should get as far to the side of the road as possible to provide additional space between you and oncoming cars. When bicycling, you will want to ride on the right (going in the same direction as automobile traffic). Another safe way to get your exercise this winter is to take advantage of the paved walking path surrounding Village Green.

Please do your part to protect yourself, drivers, and other pedestrians!




