























## 2025 JAZZ IN THE PARK

#### **DIRECTIONS:**


1. Cut up all vegetables into small pieces. Brown sausage, and cut into small hunks or quarters.

**4.** I also suggest to accompany this dish with Italian bread and a fresh salad to make it even more delicious!



## BRUCE DUYKERS

Resident of Lighthouse Drive





#### How long have you lived in Wind Point? Where was home before moving to the village?

My wife, Gretchen, and I moved from northern Idaho last October 2024. We are slowly restoring this historic 1902 home gradually, while retaining some of its original character.

#### What motivated you to reside in Wind Point?

We wanted to be closer to family in three neighboring states. We looked at Wind Point specifically because we wanted to be close to Lake Michigan in a quiet community.

What do you like about living here? We really enjoy the lake and the privacy that exists in the Village. At the same time, we really enjoy meeting new people, and exploring this part of Wisconsin.

Where are you originally from/ where did you each grow up? We're both from the Midwest. Gretchen is from Champaign-Urbana, Illinois. I grew up in Highland, Indiana.

How long have you been married? We've been married 34 years.

#### Do you have any children? I have three. Gretchen has no children,


and is a terrific stepmom.

You have been involved with many forms of art throughout your career. How did this journey start? I started as a sign painter in my teens and then moved on to study at the American Academy of Art in Chicago. I studied life drawing, advertising art, layout, and lettering design.

#### Can you share how the love of a specific kind of art unexpectantly provided you with another opportunity with a different form of art?

I started in Chicago at a small advertising agency creating savings and loan brochures. After two years, I was drafted into the US Army and was sent to work on secret projects involving troop movements, illustrations and slide shows for brigadier

generals at Fort Lee (recently renamed to Fort Gregg-Adams in 2023) and then Fort Belvoir, Virginia.

I finished my duty, returned to Chicago and worked at Foote, Cone and Belding Agency, a large advertising agency. I served as an Art Director for many accounts including SC Johnson, Kimberly Clark, Sears' DieHard, and First National Bank in both print and television commercials.

Eventually we left Chicago and moved to San Francisco to work at BBDO ad agency as an art supervisor and copywriter on accounts such as Crocker Bank, PG&E, and Pacific Telephone.

After three years living in San Francisco, I decided to try my luck with doing voice overs for commercials in Hollywood. This involved a move to Los Angeles. I got a good agent and went on auditions but faced stiff competition from Hollywood actors.

After a year and a half, I moved back to Chicago and I continued to record many national radio and television commercials for Chicago agencies. The next twelve years were great and I loved it, never realizing my art career would take me into broadcasting

In 1992 Gretchen and I moved out west to the small town of Ennis, Montana, not far from Bozeman. We bought a large log home on 34 acres with spectacular views of the Madison Valley.

I painted many western-themed oils and pastels, most En plein air. (En plein air is a French phrase meaning 'in the open air' and references the practice of painting outdoors by



capturing the light and atmosphere of that particular moment.)

Gretchen started a photography business. She was doing fine art photography, portraits, weddings, and commercial photography. Her photos are featured in a coffee table book, *The Art of the Creel*.

After 12 years we moved further west for less cold and wind to the northern Idaho city of Sandpoint, which is just 66 miles south of the Canadian border. We loved the huge lake and mountainous surroundings. I had a few art shows and started doing abstract work along with realistic works. Sandpoint and Sagle are

beautiful towns to enjoy culturally and socially, with many opportunities to enjoy the outdoors.

#### What is your current favorite form of painting and drawing?

I transitioned to large abstract paintings in Idaho, finding it challenging and fun, while continuing with realistic works. Drawing is a process that I have always loved as it is the basis for painting realistically, so I often sketch animals and people in pen and ink just for enjoyment.

Now I plan to incorporate realistic themes here, as I did years ago doing watercolors in Galena.

Do you have a personal favorite piece of art or pieces of art that you have created?

I've recently done some American Indian portraits using turn-of-century photos.

#### What do you enjoy most about painting?

I think one just approaches a blank canvas or paper and waits for an idea, or sketches something first, much like an architect would do.

#### What is something you would like to share when it comes to creating art that many people may not know or consider?

I don't paint thinking of what sells. That doesn't work for me. Sometimes I just paint because I have to do it or lose it.

When I'd go out with another artist in Chicago, sketching or painting under autumn leaves.

he would say to me as we were setting up: "Just pull it down like a window shade. It either sings or it doesn't." Every artist has to find their own style.

Some people may feel intimidated trying to draw or paint. What can you share with them to allow themselves the opportunity to give it a try?

We all have some talent. It may be latent but needs a little coaxing. You do not have to create a masterpiece. It's good to learn from a mentor or someone who can help you over the fear of creating. I recommend reading *The Art Spirit* by Robert Henri, a great painter and writer, about the do's and don'ts of painting. It is a great book to read and re-read.

Talking about art is like talking about jazz; it is better to just do it and see where it goes! I've been very lucky in life as a creative person, either selling ad ideas or painting. I've sold works all over the country from Washington DC to California and in between. I feel very fortunate to still be able to make art.

Computers have certainly taken over the creative approach in many fields but replacing the brushstroke, pencil, pen, or pastel is still a little hard to replicate. I started painting signs on trucks and cars and now that industry is nearly all computer vinyl. I've painted cartoons on windows at Christmas time and now it is printed cards and plastic.

Still, it is the artist who goes outdoors, sets up an easel, and paints. No computer has mastered that yet.

(Years ago, we first published this article in Racine County Eye. With summer now in full swing, we felt it was worth re-sharing with our Wind Point families to help maintain routine and reduce the stress of the changes that accompany summer break.)

Calvin is outside in his outdoor tent today. So eager to get out there; after just minutes, he whines to get back in. Using my kind but firm voice, I tell him, "Hey buddy, you asked to be out there. Now relax and go ni-night for a while. Calvin, our cat, is now relaxing and lying down.

I don't pretend to believe that he comprehends everything I say to him, but I know he understands a few words, including relax and ni-night. More importantly, he recognizes a familiar tone of voice, introduced to him as a kitten, which signals that this particular exchange is not open for negotiation.

Anyone who has been around a cat knows that they are notorious for whining until they get what they want—but are there exceptions? In our experience, whether it is a cat, a dog, or a human, if you say what you mean and follow through, you can indeed decrease instances of being tested with whining and begging.

When it comes to children, follow-through is important. Setting **conditions** and requiring family **procedures** to be followed when children are young is key to managing a home with greater ease.

Once you have decided that a boundary is reasonable and appropriate, use a firm but kind voice to signal that you are requiring something of your child. And, if you are planning to implement a new boundary, be sure to give your child a heads-up.

Here are some examples of both new and established boundaries shared by other parents:

- Before we leave, can you tell me some of the rules we have for playing at the beach?
- We will not be getting any candy in the checkout line at the grocery store today. We're not here for that. I have a list and I'm sticking to it.
- We all sit at the table together for supper. (You can start modeling this at a young age to demonstrate a procedural expectation.)
- Remember, all devices, TV, phones, and gaming systems have to be turned off by 8:00 pm.
- Mom is going to have 30 minutes of quiet time every day from now on. I will need you to play by yourself during this time. Let's think of things you can do—What ideas do you have?

These are simply examples; they may or may not align with your values. The important thing is that YOU set reasonable boundaries that both reflect your needs and those of your child.

If/when your child attempts to 'change your mind' by crying and acting out, you can feel confident to stand firm with your decision.

#### Be matter-of-fact, be confident, be real—Both you and your child deserve this.

Remember when creating our boundaries, there is no 'One size fits all' for children. Parents must consider age and cognitive ability when creating boundaries. And of course, there are exceptions when we may need to adjust our decisions due to our child's changing physical and emotional needs.

Setting and being consistent with reasonable, valueoriented, family boundaries reduce arguments and stress, provide a feeling of security for the child, and demonstrate a parental commitment to family culture.

And we all deserve to live in a home free of constant whining and begging, and from ever having to hear that cringeworthy plea of, "Pretty Pleeeease?"

Even Calvin knows that won't fly in our house.

#### BRANCH COLLECTION REMINDERS:

Please remember the following branch collection procedures are in place to help keep this service as costeffective as possible:
Branches should be placed by the road in small, reasonably uniform piles with the cut end toward the road, all in the same direction.

Piles should not exceed 4 feet in height and 4 feet in width.

Branches that exceed 8 feet in length and 4 inches in diameter will not be collected.

Residents are asked to keep branches at their original length and not cut them into smaller pieces (unless over 8 feet in length).

Up to 15 minutes will be spent per property on collecting and chipping; if it takes longer than 15 minutes, a tag will be left on the remaining piles, and the owner will have the option to remove the piles or have them collected for a fee.

Branch collection is for tree maintenance, not tree removal. If you hire someone to remove trees on your property, please do not use the Village's branch collection service for removing the debris from your property.

Reminder to use Johns Yard Waste program for brush or other items that can be used by their collection. Small sticks, trimming, and other brushes can be put in a brown bag or tin, and they will pick up the items.

- All yard waste must be contained.
- Most ideally, the items would be in paper compostable bags and securely sealed;
- Or in containers 32 gal/60lbs or less.
- Accept securely bundled yard waste, including brush that is no more than 50 lbs or 4ft long, or 6in in diameter.

#### KEEP GRASS OFF THE STREET

With warmer days and sunshine, lawn mowing season is here. Please ensure that when you or a contractor mows your yard that your grass clippings go into a bagger system or



back into your yard and not into the street.

You may have never thought about it, but grass clippings can act as a sheet of ice for cyclists in the middle of the summer. Grass clippings in the street provide a slippery surface for bicycle and motorcycle riders, making it a riding hazard. Let's keep our roadways safe for all our riders!

#### GARLIC MUSTARD INFORMATION

Garlic mustard is a European woodland plant introduced to North America by early settlers. Garlic mustard starts growing earlier in the season than native plants in Wisconsin and outcompetes them. It also produces large quantities of seed, resulting in it rapidly spreading in wooded areas.

Many of our yards are playing host to garlic mustard. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources recommends hand-pulling at or before the onset of flowering. You may also try to control infestations with a 1-2% active ingredient solution of glyphosate, but beware that this solution will kill other plants too. Apply and use the safety measures listed on the product label.

To dispose of garlic mustard, place the plants in their own separate sealed garbage bags and place them in your regular garbage cart. If you have more bags than the cart can fit, you can arrange a special pickup with Johns Disposal.

#### SAFETY TIPS FROM CHIEF SHARRETT

#### **Home Safety Tips**

- Install lighting, such as motion lights or dusk-todawn detector lights, on your home's exterior.
- Trim shrubbery around your home to eliminate hiding places.
- Your address should be clearly visible from the street for emergency and identification purposes.
- Close and lock your garage door when you are not nearby. Place valuables stored in the
- garage in a locking device not visible from the street when the garage door is open.
- Do not leave bikes unattended. Lock your bikes, even if you are going to be away for only a few moments.
- If you sleep on the second floor of your home, keep all firstfloor doors and windows closed and locked.

#### Vehicle Safety Tips

- Always lock your doors and close your windows when you leave your car. Make sure to take your keys with you.
- Do not leave valuables in the car. If you must leave possessions in your vehicle, keep them out of sight or hidden in the trunk.
- Before you get into your car, check the backseat and around the car. Lock your doors once inside the car.




